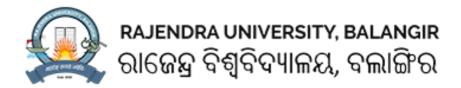

1. ABOUT THE UNIVERSITY

Rajendra University, Balangir, recognized by UGC as a State Public University, owes its origin to an Intermediate College setup in Balangir in 1944 by Maharaja Rajendra Narayan Sighdeo, the ex-ruler of the erstwhile Patna State and one of the former Chief Ministers of Odisha. This College was subsequently upgraded to a Degree College in 1946. It was granted autonomy with effect from 01.04.2002. Because of its consistent efforts in opening up avenues for better teaching and learning atmosphere in higher education, it has been upgraded to a University with effect from 01 September 2020. Sprawl over 200 acres, it marks the grandeur of greenery in its entire campus. The meditative scholars of the university boast of its library, which is one of the oldest and most affluent in the state of Odisha. Since its inception, it has been consistently acting as a hub of knowledge for teachers and students, those who have been recognized worldwide in different domains of society. In addition, it is marked as a center for disseminating the knowledge of local culture, tradition, and ways of life to the world.

The University functions under the administrative control of the Higher Education Department of the Government of Odisha, and is granted jurisdiction over the Colleges of the revenue districts of Balangir and Subarnapur imparting teaching in Arts, Sciences, Commerce, Teacher Education, and Medical education in Allopathy and Ayurveda. Prof. Dr. Uma Ballava Mohapatra, an eminent scholar as well as an experienced administrator has assumed office as its first Vice-Chancellor on 20 April 2021.

The university has an 'administrative block', where all administrators along with their office sit. It has also some class rooms. There is a 'science block' where most of the science streams runs. It has a 'commerce block' where Commerce along with B.Ed and Integrated B.Ed M.Ed.courses run. There is also a 'green building' where Computer Science, Statistics and Mathematics department run. A nicely designed 'new academic block' is constructed newly where almost all department run their PG courses.

Rajendra University, Balangir, has taken a significant step towards advancing its digital infrastructure with the successful installation of a high-speed BSNL Wi-Fi network across the entire campus. With a dedicated 1 Gbps fibre-optic line, the new network ensures fast, reliable, and secure internet access for students, faculty, and staff-empowering learning, research, and administrative functions in the digital era. The network covers all academic buildings, including lecture halls, laboratories, faculty rooms, and research centers, ensuring that teaching and learning activities are supported by stable connectivity. The Administrative Building is fully equipped with LAN points and Wi-Fi access, enabling faster processing of academic and administrative work. A key highlight of the project is its inclusive coverage of all hostels—both boys' and girls'—so that students residing on campus can enjoy continuous access to online learning resources, digital libraries, and communication platforms. This facility is especially beneficial for students engaged in online projects, coding assignments, research collaborations, and virtual learning sessions.

2. COURSES OFFERED

Students taking admission into UG Computer science have to pay Rs. 10,000/- per annum whereas for PG they have to pay Rs. 30,000/-fees per annum towards self-financing. Similarly, students wishing to get admission for B.Ed will have to pay Rs. 45,000/- per annum whereas for Integrated B.Ed-M.Ed they will have to pay Rs. 50,000/- per annum.

In addition to these, Ph.D. students were also registered every year.

3. COURSE STRUCTURE

Our UG courses run as per NEP2020 whereas PG courses run as per CBCS. Whereas B.Ed. and Integrated B.Ed-M.Ed courses run as per National Council of Teacher Education (NCTE) 2014.

a) NEP2020

National Education Policy (NEP2020) aims the undergraduate programs to extend over four academic years (Eight Semesters) with multiple entry and exit options. Candidate has to complete the Three /Four years course within Seven Years from the date of admission. Under no circumstances, the candidate will be allowed to appear the backlog exam beyond the specific period. Among different options our university is offering Three Year Degree course with single major and two minors at present. A student has to complete the 126 course credits for three year degree course. It is mandatory for all the students to registrar themselves with Academic Bank of credit (ABC) and upload all required information.

Odia, Hindi, Geography, Political Science, Education, Mathematics, Zoology, Chemistry (for students having either Mathematics or Computer Science or Zoology as Core –I)

4. ADMISSION PROCEDURE

The entire admission process for Undergraduate and Post graduate course is being conducted through the Student Academic Management System (SAMS) portal (website: samsodisha.gov.in/) as per the guidelines issued by the Government of Odisha from time to time.

Rajendra University offers UG and PG courses in 19 different subjects including regular and Self-Finance courses. Selection of candidates is strictly based on merit prepared by SAMS following Government of Odisha norms. For UG admission, %age of marks secured at +2 level is considered whereas for PG, %age secured in Common PG Entrance Test (CPET) is considered. Reservation policy for SC, ST, SEBC, EWS, PwD, etc. is fully implemented as per government guidelines.

5. EXAMINATION & EVALATION PROCEDURE

For UG: A student after completion of 1st academic Session with completion of 42 Credits and an additional 04 Credits in vocational stream can exit with a certificate issued by the University. Such student can re–enter to the UG programme into the 3rd semester within two years from award of his certificate. A student after completion of 2nd year with 84 and an additional 4 credit in Vocational Stream can exit with a diploma. Such students can re-enter to UG programme in 5th semester within two years from award of this diploma. Student who desires to undergo a 3-year degree programme will be allowed to exit after completion of 3rd year with minimum of 126 credits with a degree. However, the total duration for completing the UG program shall not exceed 7 years from the admission into the 1st year Academic Session.

Mid semester examination will be of 1-hour duration for 20/10 marks (20 for subjects having no practical and 10 for subject with practical papers). For subjects with practical, there will be a Mid-Semester practical examination carrying 10 marks. There shall be no pass mark in Mid Semester examination. However, absence in the mid semester examination will be considered as fail. A student who fails to appear in a Mid-Semester Examination will be allowed one more chance (with written permission from Chairperson, PGC) to take the same examination before appearing the concerned term-end examination. There will be no provision to reappear in the Mid-Semester Examination for improvement. The End term examination will be of 3 hours duration for 60/50 marks (60 for subjects without and 50 for with practical paper). The question pattern in theory papers consists of Objective type, Very short type, Short type and Long type.

For PG: If any student fails to fill up the form for first semester in PG, s/he will not be allowed to continue for next consequent semesters A Candidate must have to complete her/his master degree within consecutive four academic years from the date of admission, failing which the candidate has to seek readmission into the first year to pursue the master degree Course.

The term-end examination shall be of 3 hours duration for 80 marks, whereas mid-term examination is of 1 hour duration for 20 marks. There shall be no mid semester examination in the practical or project papers.

For UG & PG: A student must have 75% attendance or above in each paper to be eligible to appear at a semester examination. However, up to 15% waiver may be granted by the Chairperson, PGC as the case may be at her/his discretion on health ground (subject to production of medical certificate) or participation in sports, cultural activities, NCC and NSS activities etc. provided she/he has taken prior permission of the Head of the Institutions for such participation and produces authentic certificate of participation from the appropriate authorities. For a candidate who represents the University in Sports /N.C.C / N.S.S. /Cultural activities during a midsemester examination, a special mid semester examination may be conducted in the subjects /papers in which she/he remained absent for such purpose / participation. However, the candidate in aforesaid cases is required to obtain prior permission from the Chairperson, PGC for such participation.

Students have to do form fill up for each End semester examination within the notified date. To do the form fill up the students need to get it certified by respective HODs. If, at any stage, it is found that a candidate has made fraudulent means for form fill up, it will stand cancelled at any stage without assigning any reason thereof.

CGPA:

A student's level of competence shall be categorized by Grade Point (GP), Semester Grade Point Average (SGPA) and Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA) secured in an examination. The marks obtained by any examinee in theory, practical and tutorial papers will be converted to Grade Point and letter Grade as per the following table.

A candidate has to secure Grade D or above to pass in each of the paper (Individually in Theory, Practical and Project). FAIL/MP/HARD CASE and Back Paper Clearance candidates in any Semester Examination are not eligible for award of Distinction. For First Class Hons, one need to have CGPA >=6.5, For Second Class Hons CGPA must be >=4.0 to <6.5

In order to pass any theory or practical component, a candidate is required to secure a minimum of "D" grade (>=40% marks) in each. To clear a semester exam, a candidate is required to pass in all theory & practical components of the semester. For First Class CGPA must be >=6.5, for Second Class CGPA must be >=5.5 to <6.5 and for Third Class CGPA must be >=4.5 to <5.5.

In general, CGPA can be converted into percentage of marks as, Percentage of Marks = $(CGPA - 0.5) \times 10^{-5}$

Repeat Examination (Back Paper Clearance):

A student obtaining Grade-F in a paper shall be considered Fail in that paper and has to clear the paper by appearing as back paper at subsequent corresponding (Odd or Even) Semester Examinations. There shall be no back paper clearance for mid semester examination.

Improvement:

A candidate who desires to improve her/his Grade in one or more core papers, is allowed to avail only one chance in the immediate subsequent year by appearing in a paper of her/his choice in the corresponding end-semester examination.

There shall be no improvement examination for practical paper or practical component of a paper having theory and practical components. The chance for improvement cannot be extended beyond the four academic years for PG.

The higher of the two marks i.e. the marks secured in a paper before the improvement examination and mark secured in the same paper in the improvement examination shall be retained for computation of result.

Re-Checking of Marks:

- a) A candidate, if so desires, may apply for re-checking of addition of marks in any theory paper only in the prescribed form on payment of requisite fees of Rs.100/- (Rupees One Hundred Only) for each theory paper within 30days from the date of publication of the result of the same examination. Here, publication means the date on which the result of the candidate has actually been published.
- b) The answer scripts and respective questions shall be placed before the Tabulator(s) for re-addition of marks. The Tabulator(s) shall checkup the re-addition, eliminate the extra answer(s) if any, and marks awarded to answers but not taken into account. In case, there is any answer left unvalued the same will be brought to the notice of the Controller of Examinations for scrutiny and re-evaluation of the leftover portion.
- c) There is no provision for re-evaluation of examined papers (both for mid-semester examination and end-semester examination).

Photocopy of the Answer Scripts:

A candidate can obtain photocopy of the valued answer script of end semester examination only on payment of Rs.500/- (Rupees Five Hundred Only) per script. The application is to be made to the Controller of Examinations in prescribed form. One has to apply within 6 (six) weeks (42 days) from the date of publication of the respective results for the above purpose. The photocopy of the valued answer script will be issued between 15 to 20 days after receiving the application along with money receipt.

6. HOSTEL FACILITIES

Rajendra University is not a residential university. It is not mandatory on the part of the university authorities to provide hostel accommodation to each and every prospective student. Any Bonafide student of the University can apply for hostel seats. Seat allotments happen on merit basis and as per the reservation norms of the Government of Odisha. Selected students need to pay Admission and Readmission Fess as fixed by the University to stay in hostels. In all hostels private messes are functioning with a fixed rate @ Rs.38/- per meal.

The hostels provide a common room with a TV set and some other indoor game articles, newspaper and periodical as approved by the respective superintendents. The Board of Residence is the final authority in all matters relating to hostels.

Students admitted into hostels are subject to the norms of Hostel Manual of the University. The use of alcohol, drugs, intoxicants and indulgence in any form of gambling and betting is strictly prohibited in the hostel. If a boarder found any disobedience to the guidelines as fixed by the authority, will be expelled from the hostel and shall deemed to have been expelled from the university also.

The hostel remains closed during pooja holidays and summer vacation. However, boarder willing to remain in the hostel for some valid reason during summer or pooja vacation must obtain special permission from the superintendent.

7. LIBRARY FACILITY

The central library of Rajendra University was established in the year 1944 by the late Rajendra Narayan Singh Deo, the then Maharaja of Balangir, who later became the Chief Minister of Odisha. Initially, it functioned only with 300 books. Now it has become of well-furnished library with more than 70,000 books, 12 numbers of academic/periodical journals, magazines and 5 numbers of newspapers, which can be accessed by both the students and staffs.

Library opens from 10am to 5pm every day except on Sundays and other holidays. Books are issued to students every day from 10am to 1:30pm. Books borrowed by the students should be returned within 15 days from the date of issue. Those who return books beyond the time limit are liable to pay a fine of Rs. 10/- per book per day. There is a separate reading room inside the library premises for students which is opened every day from 10am to 5pm.

No student is allowed to any university examination unless he/she obtains a "No Dues" certificate from the Chief Librarian and no student shall be given a transfer certificate without producing library clearance.

8. SCHOLARSHIPS

The students can avail different National and State scholarships as per the criteria fixed by Govt. Thus, students are required to first check the eligibility criteria and register themselves online and then apply for scholarships.

National Scholarships

Students can apply online under different schemes of National Scholarships by visiting to the website scholarships.gov.in. Different scholarships are as follows

- 1) National Scholarship for Post Graduate Studies, provided by UGC
- 2) Central Sector Scheme of Scholarships for College and University Students by Department of Higher Education
- 3) Post Matric Scholarship for Students with Disabilities by Department of Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities.

State Scholarships

Students are advised to visit the state scholarship portal <u>scholarship.odisha.gov.in</u> from time to time for any updated guidelines by Govt. The different scholarships coming under Mukhyamantri Medhabi Chhatra Protshahana Yojana (MMCPY) and others are as follows

- 1) e-Medhabruti UG Merit Scholarship (UG merit) (only for UG students)
- 2) e-Medhabruti PG Merit Scholarship (PG merit) (only for PG students)
- 3) Vyasakabi Fakir Mohan Bhasabruti (VFMB)
- 4) Gopabandhu Sikkya Sahayata Yojana (GSSY)
- 5) Nirman Shramik Kalyan Yojana
- 6) Post Matric Scholarship (PMS)

Criteria:

- a) Must be a Permanent resident of Odisha and certificate must be issued by Tahasildar/ Add. Tahasildar
- b) SC/ST/OBC certificate must be issued by Tahasildar/ Add. Tahasildar
- c) Income certificate of current fiscal year from Tahasildar/Add. Tahasildar. For PMS, family income must be below 2.5 lakhs/yr, for UG & PG Merit, family income must be 8 lakhs/yr
- d) Student applying for PMS, must have secured more than 50% marks in last exam passed, except for SC & ST, for UG merit, s/he must have secured more than 55% marks in +2 and for PG merit, s/he must have secured more than 55% marks in UG.
- e) Students pursuing any Self-Financing Course are not eligible for e-Medhabruti (U.G. / P.G. Merit) scholarships.
- f) One who applies for PMS cannot apply e-Medhabruti Scholarships and vice versa.
- g) Students already in receipt of scholarships under any other schemes administered by the State or Central Govt. are also ineligible for e-Medhabruti.
- h) Vyasakabi Fakir Mohan Bhasabruti (VFMB), is only for students studying UG with Odia honours or studying PG in Odia. UG students must have secured minimum of 70% marks in aggregate in +2 and PG students must have minimum of 60% marks in Odia Honours/major.
- i) Gopabandhu Sikhya Sahayata Yojana is a State scheme to extend financial assistance to the students of underprivileged sections i.e. a) HIV/AIDS affected parents; b) Households without shelter; c) Destitute/living on alms; d) Manual Scavengers; e) Particularly Vulnerable Tribal Groups; f) Legally released bonded labourers and Single mother families for pursuing UG & PG in the State of Odisha.
- j) Nirman Shramik Kalyan Yojana is to extend financial assistance to the eligible building and other construction workers for continuing education of their wards.

9. EXTRA-CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

a) NCC UNIT

The National Cadet Corps (NCC) unit of Rajendra University is affiliated to 11 Odisha Battalion of NCC, Balangir. It offers three years course to degree students. The authorized strength for both SD Senior Division for Boys and SW Senior Wings for girls is 52. The NCC course includes both 'B' and 'C' certificate examinations; B certificate in the NCC 2nd year and C in 3rd year.

The aim of NCC Unit of Rajendra University is to develop the quality of leadership, discipline, good character, comradeship, spirit of adventures and an ideal of selfless service among the youth. Along with B and C certificate examination, students get chance to take part in different camps at state, national and international level which carries extra marks to their career at the same time students get chance to expose their self in broader platform. The important camps are RDC, TSC, TREKKING, etc. As per the given strength from the Battalion, every year new batch joins the unit through physical, written and viva test.

b) NSS UNIT

"NOT ME BUT YOU" is the motto of National Service Scheme (NSS). We have a NSS unit comprising of 100 numbers of boys and girls. Different events such as Mega Plantation Drive (Ek Ped Maa Ke Naam), Blood Donation Camp, International Yoga Day on 21st June, District Level Youth Leadership Camp, International Virtual Symposium etc are organized. Students do participate in National Integration Camp, Car Festival at Puri, State-Level Mountaineering Camp, Skilled Development/ Career Counselling Programme, State Level Pre-Republic Day Parade Selection Camp and do celebrate Dr. B.R. Ambedkar's birthday on 14th April every year.

c) RED CROSS UNIT

A Beacon of Humanity: Red Cross Unit, Rajendra University, stands as a shining example of youth-led humanitarian service and social commitment. Under the guidance of dedicated faculty and the enthusiasm of student volunteers, the unit actively upholds the ideals of the Indian Red Cross Society—service, health, and voluntary action.

Whether it's organizing blood donation camps, conducting first-aid training, promoting hygiene awareness, or extending relief during natural calamities, the unit remains at the forefront of community welfare. Through regular camps, awareness drives, and health initiatives, it fosters a sense of responsibility, compassion, and leadership among students.

With its vibrant activities and tireless spirit, the Red Cross Unit of Rajendra University continues to inspire many—echoing the timeless message: "Serving humanity is the best form of service."

d) STUDENTS WELFARE UNIT

The Career Counselling and Placement cells are functional under Students Welfare Officer which takes care of counselling of students for awareness regarding various career options of different fields. Various Government and Private Organizations have conducted sessions on different aspects to boost the knowledge of students. Similarly, Placement Cell coordinates various placement drives as required by different Government and private organizations.

Various Government projects like SDG Innovation Connect 2024-25, PM Internship scheme 2025, Innovation and Start up Competition 2025 were successfully implemented at Rajendra University, Balangir. Students of both UG and PG including passed out students are informed regularly in case any Career opportunity noticed through different channels.

e) ATHELETIC ASSOCIATION

Athletic Association of Rajendra University plays a vital role in promoting physical fitness, teamwork, and sportsmanship among its students. As a dynamic and inclusive organization, it serves as the central body coordinating various sports and athletic events across the university campus, fostering a culture of healthy competition and holistic development. The association oversees the planning and execution of inter-departmental tournaments, intramural leagues, and annual sports festivals, which is held towards the mid of November every year. It also supports the university sports council in preparing teams for inter-university, state, and national-level competitions by facilitating access to coaching, equipment, and training facilities. 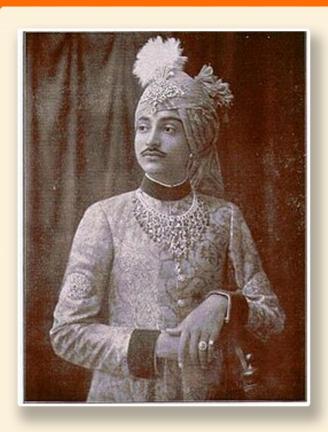
